Body found in Agana Heights

Police, GMH give no details pending autopsy

The Guam Police Department is conducting a death investigation after a body was found in Agana Heights near Nana's Store just before noon yesterday.

The body was covered with a white sheet and transported in an ambulance to Guam Memorial Hospital.

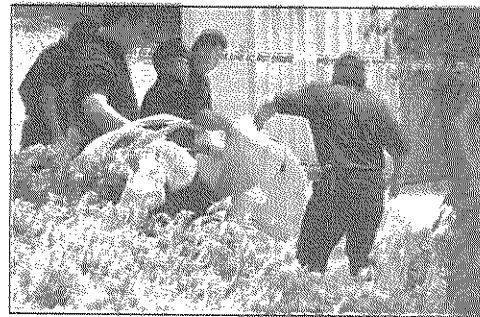
According to GMH nursing supervisor Sally Quichocho, the body was

that of a 51-year-old man. He was pronounced dead upon arrival at 12:20 p.m.

Quichocho couldn't provide further details, such as whether the body had any wounds or what the cause of death might have been.

"Pending an autopsy, GPD has no further details that can be provided at this time," GPD spokesman Officer John Edwards said in an e-mail.

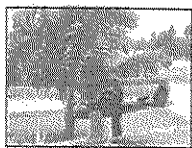
Guam Medical Examiner Dr. Aurelio Espinola didn't return calls made to his work and cell phones.

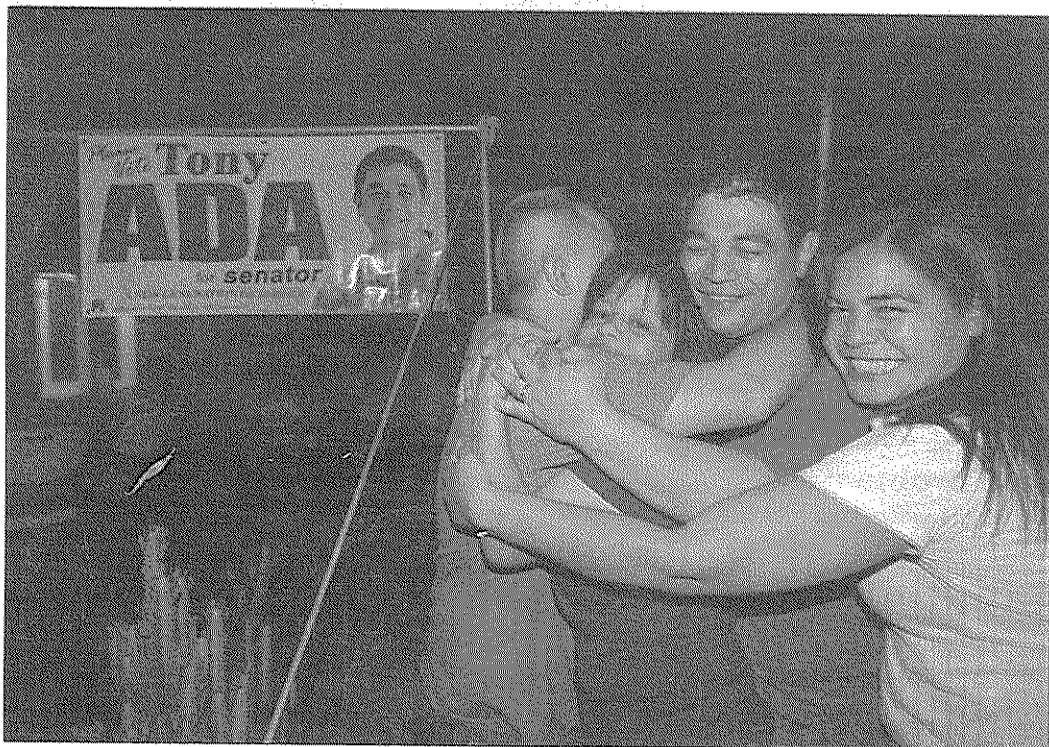

Ada likely to be next senator

Republican Anthony "Tony" Ada will be the island's newest senator.

Preliminary results of yesterday's special election show Tony Ada had a commanding lead with 3,358 votes of 7,664 total votes cast.

"It's a humbling feeling," Tony Ada said as early results showed him taking the lead ahead of Democratic candidate Sarah Thomas-Nededog.

Thomas-Nededog placed No. 2 with 1,503 votes, according to unofficial results from all 58 precincts.

The Guam Election Commission board will meet at noon tomorrow to certify the election results, said board member Josh Tenorio.

Depending on how things go after that, Tenorio said, the winner could be certified as soon as Tuesday.

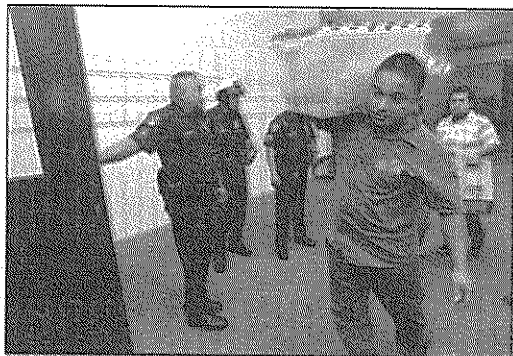
